Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery Presents First Ontario Solo Exhibition by Renowned Indigenous Artist Lawrence Paul Yuxweluptun Lets'lo:tseltun

KITCHENER, ON – The Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery is honored to present the first solo exhibition in Ontario by Lawrence Paul Yuxweluptun Lets'lo:tseltun, one of Canada's most outspoken and influential contemporary artists.

From June 14 to October 5, 2025, *Floor Opener* showcases four decades of hard-hitting, polemical, yet playful artworks confronting colonialist suppression, environmental degradation, and the ongoing struggles for Indigenous sovereignty.

Of Cowichan (Hul'q'umi'num Coast Salish) and Okanagan (Syilx) descent, Yuxweluptun presents his ideas through powerful contemporary imagery that merges traditional iconography with urgent representations of environmental destruction and colonial history. His works serve as brutal critiques of issues including land title disputes, residential schools, and ecological devastation, establishing him as a pivotal voice in contemporary art.

"The Gallery is pleased and grateful to be able to host this exhibition of work by Lawrence Paul Yuxweluptun Lets'lo:tseltun, a visionary artist whose work has amplified issues surrounding environmental, political, and cultural issues all through an Indigenous lens for many years. We take our role in acting on Truth and Reconciliation seriously, and this project is one of many reflecting our intent," notes Executive Director Shirley Madill. "More than ever, we need the weight of provocation agitated in Yuxweluptun's work during a time of increasing global unrest."

Yuxweluptun's artistic practice spans painting, sculpture, and multimedia works replete with masked fish farmers, super-predator oil barons, abstracted ovoids, and unforgettable depictions of a spirit-filled but now toxic natural world. While rooted in traditional Coast Salish and Okanagan iconography and form, the issues he articulates are inextricably woven into our collective present moment.

#### About the Artist

Lawrence Paul Yuxweluptun Lets'lo:tseltun lives and works on unceded, traditional and ancestral xwməθkwəy'əm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish), and səl'ilw'əta?ł (Tsleil-Waututh) territories. An artist of Coast Salish and Okanagan descent, he graduated from the Emily Carr College of Art and Design in British Columbia. Influential as both artist and activist, Yuxweluptun merges traditional iconography with representations of the environment and the history of colonization, resulting in his powerful, contemporary imagery; his work is replete with masked fish farmers, superpredator oil barons, abstracted ovoids and unforgettable depictions of a spirit-filled, but now toxic, natural world.

Highly respected, Yuxweluptun's work has also been displayed in numerous international group and solo exhibitions, including the seminal *INDIGENA:* Contemporary Native Perspectives (1992) at the Canadian Museum of History (then the Canadian Museum of Civilization) and in Sakahàn: International

Indigenous Art (2013) at the National Gallery of Canada. In 1998, Yuxweluptun was the recipient of the Vancouver Institute for the Visual Arts (VIVA) Award. He was also honoured in 2013 with a prestigious Fellowship at the Eitelijorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art in Indianapolis. Other major projects include the 30-year survey *Unceded Territories* at the Museum of Anthropology at the University of British Columbia, which also produced a full-colour publication and commissioned texts.
